IP2016 - Global Conflict and Security

The world faces today a multitude of security challenges, from the humanitarian needs arising from the internal situation in Syria to the effects of the 2004 tsunami in Southeast Asia, Iran's nuclear plans, the growing vulnerability of migration flows and the impact of international terrorism in national security strategies. This course provides students with the tools to critically engage with the various meanings that the concept of "security" has acquired in the last few decades, taking into account its political, military, cultural, environmental and economic sources, from the local to the global. This richer understanding of the multifaceted nature of security will provide a stronger basis to understand a number of contemporary threats, actors and responses in the world stage. In sum, the course will cover the main understandings of security, both traditional and non-traditional, but will also enquire into the nature and solutions of today's violent conflicts, as developed both by nation-states and international organizations as well as other security actors. Furthermore, other types of "global conflict" will be explored to provide a rich overview of the main threats in today's world. Knowledge of the issues included in this module is also considered essential to understand the behaviour of many actors in international politics.
